A general merchant for more than half a century whose code has been "Be honest and fair-dealing and the public will deal fairly with you," Edward C. Baird, proprietor of Baird's General Merchandise, since 1969, has amnounced his retirement. His place of business, a familiar Newberg landmark, has been sold to the Western Auto Supply Co.

A bustling emporium after the turn of the century, Baird's store has been managed with the same strict policy for four decades, and will close only because it's genial awner wishes to withdraw from bustliess. Wednesday workmen were removing the long tables on which have been displayed everything from corsets to confetti.

While large stores in large cities While large stores in large cities are turning toward the general merchandising field and are selling a great variety of goods, Baird believes that the day of the small general store is gone. He says that shopkeepers in smaller cities cannot maintain adequate stocks.

Although retiring from husiness, Mr. and Mrs. Baird said that they intend to remain in Newberg and declared that they have greatly enjoyed their business life here.

Formerly owner of a general store in Bartlesville, Okla., Baird came to Newberg in October, 1909. He had previously been with the Santa Fe railroad at East Min.

Piloting a light, plywood craft powered with a 5 h. p. motor, Arnold Nelson of Portland was first. It classed time for the run from Independence to Newberg was one, hour and 43 minutes. Nelson was announced first place winner in Class I, and was also awarded the typrews' Jewelry of Newberg and the Diamond Shop of McMinnville. Boats Upset

The two river upsets involved Loren Lottis of Salem and Stanley R. Hultberg of Newberg.

Lottis, according to observers, capsized his craft below the Wheatland pool, swam ashore towing his boat behind him, baied it out, cleaned up the motor, launched it and completed the remainder of the race.

Hultberg capsized a moment after he had passed the finish line. His boat was retrieved by officials, and it was not learned until later that Christie had passed Hultberg in the race, Christie was later awarded first prize in Class VI. Crowds Large
